**David Baines
Columnist
Vancouver Sun**

After graduating with a degree in English Literature at Queen's University in 1972, David took his initial foray into journalism, first at the Winnipeg Tribune and then the Vancouver Sun.

In 1976, David returned to school to do an MBA at the University of Western Ontario. He then spent five years in commercial banking with the Bank of Montreal and TD Bank. In 1988, he returned to the Vancouver Sun, where he works as a columnist and reporter covering the junior stock market and white collar crime.

In his writings, David has shown little patience for securities industry participants who work against the public interest. Among his targets have been regulatory bodies such as the B.C. and Ontario Securities Commissions; self-regulatory organizations such as the Investment Dealers Association, the B.C. Law Society and the Institute of Chartered Accountants; as well as prosecutorial and judicial bodies.

For his effort, he has received many journalistic awards, including four national newspaper awards (the second highest in Canadian history), a national magazine award and four Jack Webster Awards. He has also been threatened, sued and defamed. Several years ago, he won a libel suit against a group of market players who accused him of trading against his column. Damages were assessed at \$875,000 plus legal costs. It was the second largest libel award in Canadian history.

David Baines has been uncovering white collar crime for the past 20 years. His column appears in the Vancouver Sun Wednesdays and Saturdays.

John Leonard introduced Dr. Gerolymatos by recalling his previous visits and how interesting and thought provoking they are remembered.

Dr. Gerolymatos began with a brief history of the Middle East beginning with the 18th century Sultan of the Ottoman Empire who saw himself as the protector of the Muslim Faith. He then took us through each of the world wars and their effects on Middle Eastern boundaries and the changes in Arab hierarchy.

The evolving leadership moved between leaders focused on Arab Nationalism and the Muslim Faith, a tension that continues today.

The USA became involved in the area unprepared with the history and complexities of the struggle years in the making and largely hidden from public awareness.

He described the extremist Muslim factions in Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Iran, each seeking to lead the Arab world.

When asked if he could see and end to the hostilities and a return to peaceful coexistence, he threw up his hands and said it was impossible to predict at this point. He could only foresee continued conflict, whether or not western forces pulled out of the area.

President Brian thanked Dr. Gerolymatos for another stimulating presentation.

He began his professional career as an Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. In 1976, the family (now including three sons) moved back to Vancouver where Terry became a partner in Cook, Pickering and Doyle Ltd., Consulting Geotechnical Engineers. Terry and Margie bought a house in West Vancouver, which remains their home to this date.

He spent the remainder of his career with Acergy S.A., one of the world's largest offshore subset contracting companies.
