Jamie H Graham
Chief Constable
Vancouver Police Department

Chief Jamie Graham was sworn in as the 29th Chief Constable of the Vancouver Police Department (VPD) in August 2002. The VPD is one of Canada's largest Police Departments with approximately 1,200 sworn police officers, 300 civilian support staff and numerous volunteers. He previously served with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for over 34 years holding command, investigative and executive positions in British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Chief Graham is an active member of Provincial, National and International Associations of Police Chiefs. He is involved in considerable committee work in support of these organizations and he has been widely recognized for his work and advocacy. Chief Graham is a member of the Major Cities Chiefs Association where he is a member of their Bylaw committee. He is also a member of the Executive Committee of Criminal Intelligence Service Canada and previously chaired their "Tier 1 Strategy" to combat outlaw motorcycle gangs. In addition, Chief Graham chairs the Gaming and Mental Health Committees of the British Columbia Association of Chiefs of Police and is their representative on the Integrated Illegal Gaming Enforcement Team Committee. He is a member of the Board of Governance for the Combined Forces Special Investigation Unit (formerly Organized Crime Agency of B.C.). He proudly serves as Commanding Officer of the world-famous Vancouver Police Pipe Band, one of the oldest in existence.

LAST MONTH'S SPEAKER



President Brian thanked Speaker Don Krogseth

Don began by telling us Nature Trust's Mission. The Nature Trust is dedicated to conserving for future generations, British Columbia's biological diversity through selective securement and effective management of areas of ecological significance and natural beauty.

In the spring of 1971, Bert Hoffmeister, a retired forestry executive, and conservationist, was riding near Pavilion, BC, when he was told Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau was calling for him. Trudeau said he had a \$4.5 million grant to finance a unique conservation project in BC. Thus the Nature Trust of British Columbia was born. Bert Hoffmeister was the Chair of the organization for the next 20 years.

Key Land Acquisitions

Antelope-brush Conservation Area, South Okanagan; secured 40 hectares (100 acres) 04.
Burgoyne Bay, Salt Spring Island; acquired 278 hectares (687 acres) along the north side of Burgoyne Bay on Salt Spring Island in 2001.
Englishman River, Vancouver Island; near Parksville on Vancouver Island, among the most endangered rivers in BC, acquired 364 hectares (898 acres).

Francis Point, Sunshine Coast; acquired 72.8 hectares (180 acres) 2001.

Hoodoos Property, East Kootenay; purchased the 4,037-hectare (10,000-acre) Hoodoos Property in 2003.

MacMillan Provincial Park, Vancouver Island; a key partner in almost doubling the size of MacMillan Provincial Park near Port Alberni on Vancouver Island including Cathedral Grove, 2005.

Roderick Haig-Brown Conservation Area; between 1976 and 1986, with partners acquired 46.9 hectares (166 acres) on the Adams River in order to participate in the establishment of 977 hectare (1,436 acre) corridor along the world-famous sockeye salmon spawning grounds of the Adams River.

Savary Island; northwest of Powell River at the mouth of Desolation Sound, Savary Island is a crescent shaped island stretching 7.5 kilometres. The Nature Trust and its partners acquired a 50% interest in 147 hectares (363 acres) of land in 2002 in order to conserve the largest intact example of rare coastal-forested dunes in western Canada.

Land management of the properties employs youth crews that remove weeds, restore wetlands and install interpretive signs for visitors who are welcome to fish, hike and hunt on the properties. Thirty young people in nine crews maintain the six regions working 2,487 person days.

Funding Partners include; individual donors, foundations and corporations, conservation organizations, federal, provincial and local governments, first nations, stewardship groups and community volunteers.

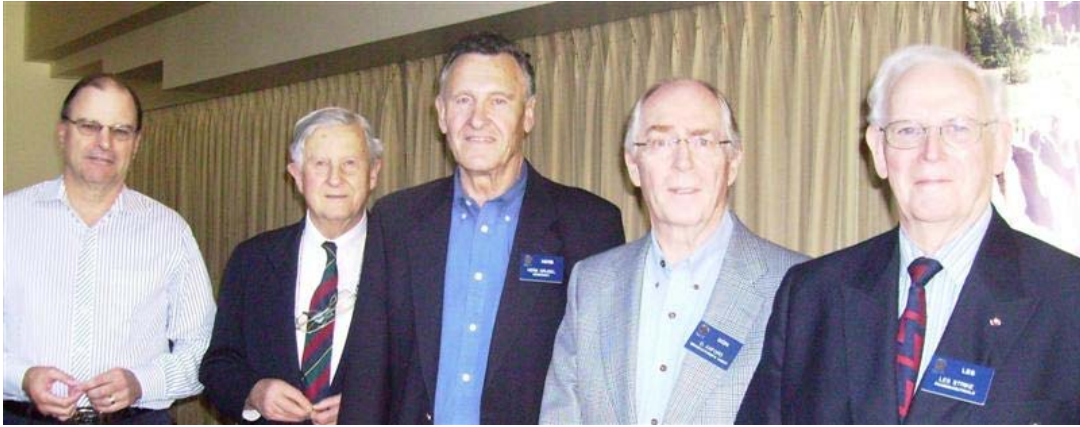
