Elspeth Bradbury,

Landscape architect and author

"History of Vancouver North Shore: A View Through the Trees"

Born in Greenock, Scotland, Elspeth Bradbury immigrated to Saint John in 1968, then moved to Vancouver in 1988. An architect and a landscape architect, she wrote *Is That You This Is Me* (Fiddlehead Poetry Books, 1982) and co-authored, along with Judy Maddocks, *The Garden Letters* (Polestar, 1995) and *The Real Garden Road Trip* (Polestar, 1997). Hoping to see as many Canadian gardens as possible, Bradbury convinced her friend and *The Garden Letters* co-author Judy Maddocks to travel with her from Point Atkinson Lighthouse in B.C. to Cape Spear, Newfoundland, the most easterly point in North America, to meet more than 80 gardeners during their three-month car trek. Along the way they encountered a vegetable garden in a boat, an arboretum on a balcony, a garden on a cliff and other unusual greenery.

While serving on the West Vancouver Heritage Advisory Committee, Elspeth Bradbury produced a coffee table book on forestry of that area as a fundraiser for the Lighthouse Park Preservation Society, *West Vancouver: A View Through the Trees* (District of West Vancouver, 2007). The book was edited by Valerie Frith. Bradbury credits the help of publishing insiders Don and Barbara Atkins, Jim Douglas, Rob Sanders and Mark Stanton as well as historians Doreen Armitage, Hugh Johnson and many other residents.

Our North Shore has been blessed with magnificent natural surroundings. Above all, it is the forest that has shaped the community's history, that colours its present, and challenges its future through the relationship between plants and people over 10,000 years of co-evolution.

Last Month Speaker

Calvin Helin released his first book *Dances with Dependency: Out of Poverty Through Self-Reliance* in 2008 and will be releasing *Surviving Dependency: Hope and Empowerment Through Self-Reliance* in 2010 which will be edited by Peter Newman, both dealing with the subject of the suffering of Canadian aboriginal people and ideas for change.

His first book received 32 letters of rejection from publishers so he borrowed the cash and published it himself. He now has a U.S. publisher and it is five times a best seller. He writes on this subject for two reasons - to try to understand why aboriginals grow up and live in such misery and to investigate the health of Canada as a nation, where aboriginals have to endure such horrible conditions.

Studies and surveys regularly rate Canada as a most preferred place to live (7th) in the world but B.C. is rated 53rd in the world where aboriginals live. Aboriginal women aged 15-25 are 8 times more likely to commit suicide than non-aboriginals and 135 times more likely to be jailed. The children are the innocent victims in this system. In his first book he concludes that all peoples, aboriginal or not, living in a culture like the welfare system under the current Indian Act, where sustenance is handed out free will develop a mindset of dependency and hopelessness.

Indian families cannot look after their own children. Canadian aboriginals make up only 3.5% of our national population but aboriginal children make up approximately 30% of Canadian children on welfare - in B.C it is over 50% and in Saskatchewan and Manitoba over 80%. The suffering is increasing rapidly because their population is growing faster than the general population.

The Canadian Indian Act looks democratic but it is not. The band chiefs are responsible to the Canadian government - Minister of Indian Affairs, not to the band,

and many chiefs help themselves while the members go without. The tribes need ethical and visionary leaders and to throw out the poor leaders.

Our Indians date back 10,000 years, were self-reliant, developed 32 different languages and lived productive lives but their quality of life has degenerated to what we see today. They once were self-sustaining but now await their welfare cheque. Welfare destroys initiative.

He closed with emphasis on the need for the aboriginal children to be educated and to gain self-respect. Our members applauded long and loudly, asked many questions and for more of his opinions. Many stayed to chat with him and to purchase 40 copies of his autographed book. A deeper awakening and understanding of this problem was the result.




Recent New Members




When you see some of these new members at our regular meetings, please be sure to introduce yourself and make them feel welcome.






