Dr. John Innes,

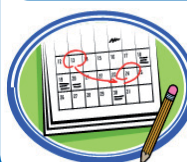
Professor and Dean, Faculty of Forestry, UBC

“Is Forestry in BC Heading for a Crisis”

Dr. John Innes grew up near St Andrews on the east coast of Scotland. He was appointed in 1999 as Forest Renewal BC Chair of Forest Management at the University of British Columbia, and in 2010 he was appointed Dean of the Faculty of Forestry. He holds an Honorary Professorial Fellowship at the University of Melbourne and adjunct professorial positions at three Chinese universities. He has worked on many facets of forest management and climate change. His recent focus has been on the ways that forests, foresters and forest-dependent communities react to externally-driven change. He is actively involved in research projects in British Columbia, Australia, Chile, Mexico, Peru and China. He is coordinator of the Task Force on ‘Resources for the Future’ of the International Union of Forest Research Organizations. Dr. Innes is an Associate Editor of the Journal of Environmental Management and Environmental Conservation, and sits on the editorial advisory boards of other journals. He has published extensively in the forestry field.

Dr. Innes will speak about whether forestry in BC is heading for a crisis. British Columbia was founded on forestry, and forestry remains a mainstay of many rural communities, but political attention on forests has been waning for a number of years. There are increasing signals that we may be approaching significant changes. These signals include increasing uncertainty over the landbase and its management, stemming in particular from the Tsilhqot’in and other recent court decisions; loss of timber supply due to bark beetle attacks; the impacts of climate change, especially on the incidence of drought, fire, and pests and disease; an ageing workforce; competition from planted forests in other parts of the world; and the impending softwood lumber dispute with the USA. How we address these changes will determine whether or not we have a crisis.
