Wandi Zhu

"The Renaissance of Traditional Chinese Culture"



Wandi Zhu, a Vancouver native, began learning Classical Chinese dance at the age of 10. She earned a full scholarship to the prestigious Fei Tian Academy of the Arts in New York, where she underwent professional training in Classical Chinese dance. After graduating from Fei Tian Academy, Miss Zhu returned to her hometown to pursue her passion for literature. She earned a BA degree from UBC, majoring in English Literature and minoring in Asian Studies, She has been actively sharing her expertise and love for traditional Chinese culture, delivering numerous presentations on Classical Chinese dance and its rich cultural heritage.

Miss Zhu's presentation will take our members on an inspiring journey through China's rich cultural history, its destruction in modern times, and the revival efforts led by Shen Yun Performing Arts.

Highlights of her presentation include:

- Introduction to Chinese Culture: Exploring 5,000 years of history, philosophical foundations (Confucianism, Taoism, Buddhism), key dynasties, and world-changing inventions.
- The Destruction of Traditional Culture: Examining the impact of the Cultural Revolution and the Chinese Communist Party on Chinese heritage.
- Reviving Cultural Traditions: Introduction to Shen Yun Performing Arts and Classical Chinese dance, including videos showcasing Shen Yun's unique artistry.

This work is guided by your MC committee and a few volunteers. We could use some extra assistance.

The adage "many hands make light work" is true. The opposite is true too. "Few hands make the work harder". More members volunteering would be appreciated by your committee members.

Our membership chair would welcome 3 or 4 folks to lend assistance. With additional help the various tasks would take minimal time. What is needed? This group has demonstrated, that with a few extra hands, the work is a lot of fun and not too time consuming to coordinate. We have had willing hands for this area of operations and their help has been truly appreciated

Finance chair has been a hard-working committee of one. Gord Adair has been our "go to guy" for a few years and would appreciate having a second person lending hand.

Our membership base has many individuals with tremendous experience as community and business leaders. Your talents are exemplary. By stepping up and providing an hour or so each month you will not only assist those currently volunteering but ensure the club has leadership to guide us as we move forward each year.

North Shore Rescue Facility Tour "The Embassy"

Join us on our next tour – the North Shore Rescue operation in North Vancouver, on Thursday, February 13th. We will have a short tour followed by a presentation; possibly a demonstration of some of their new rescue technology.

NS Rescue was called out 139 times last year, according to Team Leader Scott Merriman. In total, he estimates the team put in10,000 hours in response time, training and administration in 2024. Because of their unique skill set (the team includes emergency room surgeons and nurses, fi remen, ex police offi cers and even an avalanche expert all volunteers) the team was requested to aid other teams around the province 34 times. Vancouver Library Tour Review

On January 7th we toured the main Vancouver Public Library on Georgia Street. A total of 17 curious Probus souls showed up in front of the library at 11:00 AM for a guided tour. Our guide was knowledgeable and lively so she kept our interest throughout the tour. We examined interesting things on all nine floors.

We were amazed at the diverse activities and things that the library does each day. The library is so much more than just a bunch of books to lend out. Each floor has a special function with books on all conceivable subjects all duly categorized with the Dewey Decimal System which I learned about in grade school. Books are separated by language, categories (engineering, climate, architecture et al) and there is a wide selection of historical books and maps. One of the most unusual offerings is a number of individual sound studios where budding artists can book time to record anything they want all for free. There are lots of quiet rooms to sit and read or work on your computer. During the day the library is open to people who just want to keep warm and there are no questions asked.

Our tour ended at 12:30 at which point we all walked over to the Brown's Social Club at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre where we had a delicious meal and appropriate beverages. It was a fun outing and we all had a good time.

January Speaker Review



Christopher Hebb poke about the life and career of Winston Churchill, British politician and statesman. He talked about the growing relevance of Winston Churchill's leadership in the modern world over time, highlighting Churchill's early years as a journalist and military officer, his shift from the Conservative to the Liberal party, and his role in World War I and II.

He also shared personal anecdotes about his interactions with Churchill and his family and touched on Churchill's relationship with Roosevelt and the importance of their friendship in the war effort, as well as his opposition to Indian independence and his views on Gandhi. Lastly, he discussed the origins of the Royal Air Force and the Royal Canadian Air Force, Churchill's views on the British Empire, and the influence of Lloyd George and Mackenzie King on Churchill's ideas.

Churchill decided to put the UK on the gold standard in 1924, which he later regretted. Churchill's focus was on social programs and the welfare of the people, and he was not a socialist. Although he was initially opposed by the British establishment, he eventually became the leader of the UK during World War II. He has been praised for his leadership and his role in shaping international policy, particularly his famous "Iron Curtain" speech.

Winston Churchill was known for his courage, sincerity, forgiveness, affection, loyalty, and humour. Churchill's leadership and results were influential in so many ways. To recognize this, the first Churchill Society was formed in Edmonton, Alberta in 1964, followed by others in Calgary, Washington DC, and the UK. The International Churchill Society was established in 1968, with societies now present in Canada, the US, the UK, and other countries. Annual conferences are held by the International Churchill Society, including one hosted in 2007 in Canada.

Our speaker expressed his privilege in serving on the International Churchill Society and as president of their society in Canada.
